(5) **Joshua** is a type of Jesus Christ in that He leads His followers to victory over their enemies, is their advocate in time of defeat, and leads them into a permanent home.

(5) Then **God speaks.** (6) **Job learns his lesson** and falls flat on the dunghill (Job 42:5–6). (7) **God restores him**—and his last state is better than his first.

(3) The fear of the Lord **prolongeth days**, 10:27. (4) In the fear of the Lord is **strong confidence**, 14:26. (5) The fear of the Lord is a **fountain of life**, 14:27. (6) **Better is little** with the fear of the Lord than great treasure and trouble therewith, 15:16. (7) The fear of the Lord is the **instruction of wisdom**, 15:33. (8) By the fear of the Lord men **depart from evil**, 16:6. (9) The fear of the Lord **tendeth to life**, 19:23. (10) By humility and the fear of the Lord are **riches and honor and life**, 22:4. (11) **Be thou in the fear of the Lord** all the day long, 23:17.

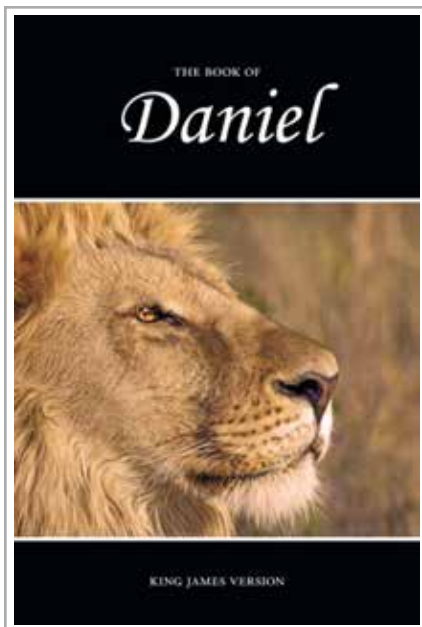
Daniel: God Is In Control

The book of Daniel shows: (1) The difficulty and possibility of **right living in bad surroundings**; (2) The **openness of righteous conduct** (I Peter 2:20); (3) The **elements of strength of character** displayed by Daniel and his Jewish companions; (4) The inevitable **conflict between good and evil**. Daniel was given special wisdom by God to interpret dreams, and he himself had several wonderful visions of future events, many of which have already occurred.

There are seven lines of testimony. (1) The testimony of **John the Baptist**. (2) The testimony of **certain other individuals**. (3) The testimony of **Jesus' works**. (4) The testimony of **Jesus Himself** ("I am . . ."). (5) The testimony of the **Scripture**. (6) The testimony of the **Father**. (7) The testimony of the **Holy Spirit**.

Seven Superiorities of Jesus Christ: (1) He is the **image of the invisible God**. (2) He **existed before all creation**. (3) **All things were created by Him and for Him**. (4) **By Him all things consist** (stay together). (5) He is the **Head of the body**, the church. (6) He is the **first person resurrected unto everlasting life**. (7) In Him **all the fullness of God dwells** that He may have the **preeminence in all things**. (See 1:15–23.) Not only is He superior in His person, but also in His saving work, for He has made peace through the shedding of His blood offered on the cross, and by this sacrifice reconciled all believers to God.

Three Analogies: (1) As Paul found Onesimus wandering from his master’s house and his place of duty, so the Lord Jesus **found us wandering** from God (Luke 19:10). (2) As Paul pleaded that all of the slave’s debts be placed to his account, and all of Paul’s merits be placed to the slave’s account, so Christ has **taken upon Himself all our sin and guilt**, and in exchange has bestowed upon us His righteousness and His divine nature (2 Peter 1:4). (3) As Philemon received Onesimus, so **God will receive us and make us profitable** for the sake of Jesus Christ (John 6:37). He can change a criminal to a brother, from unprofitable to profitable.

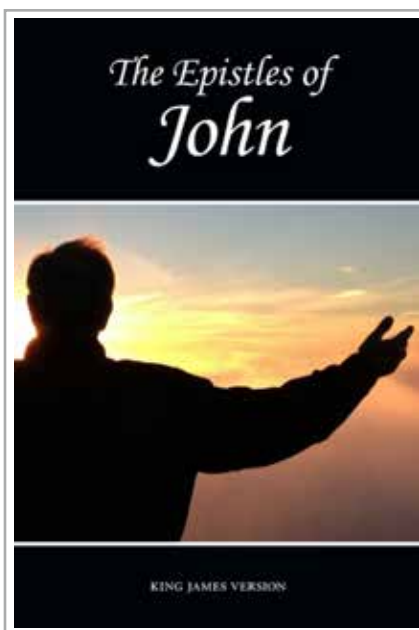

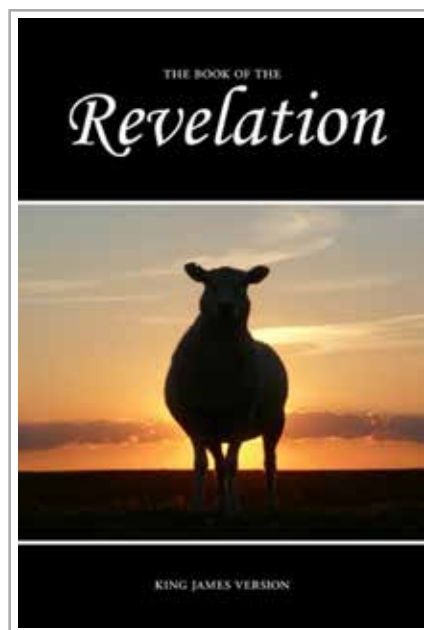

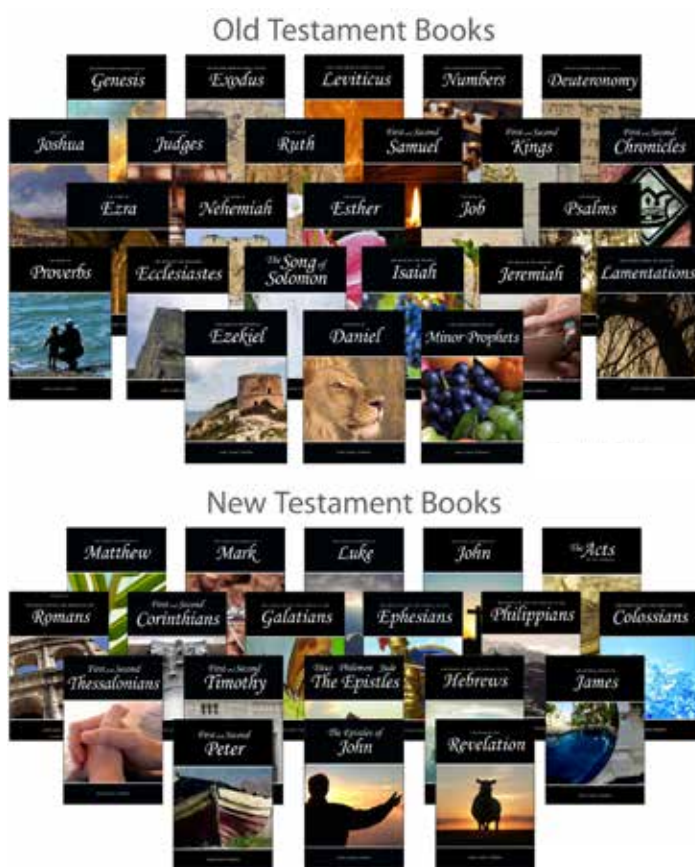
